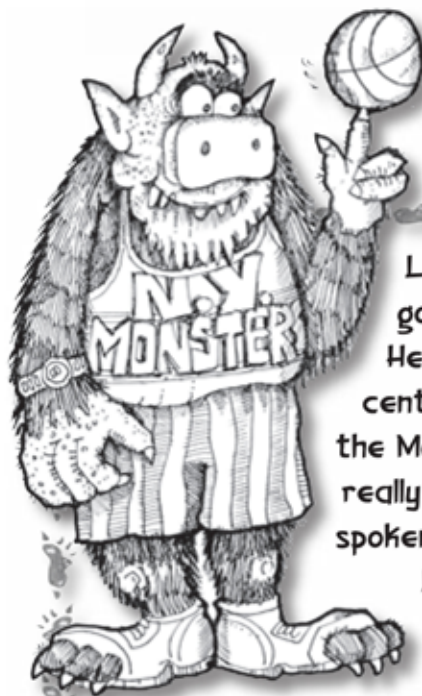

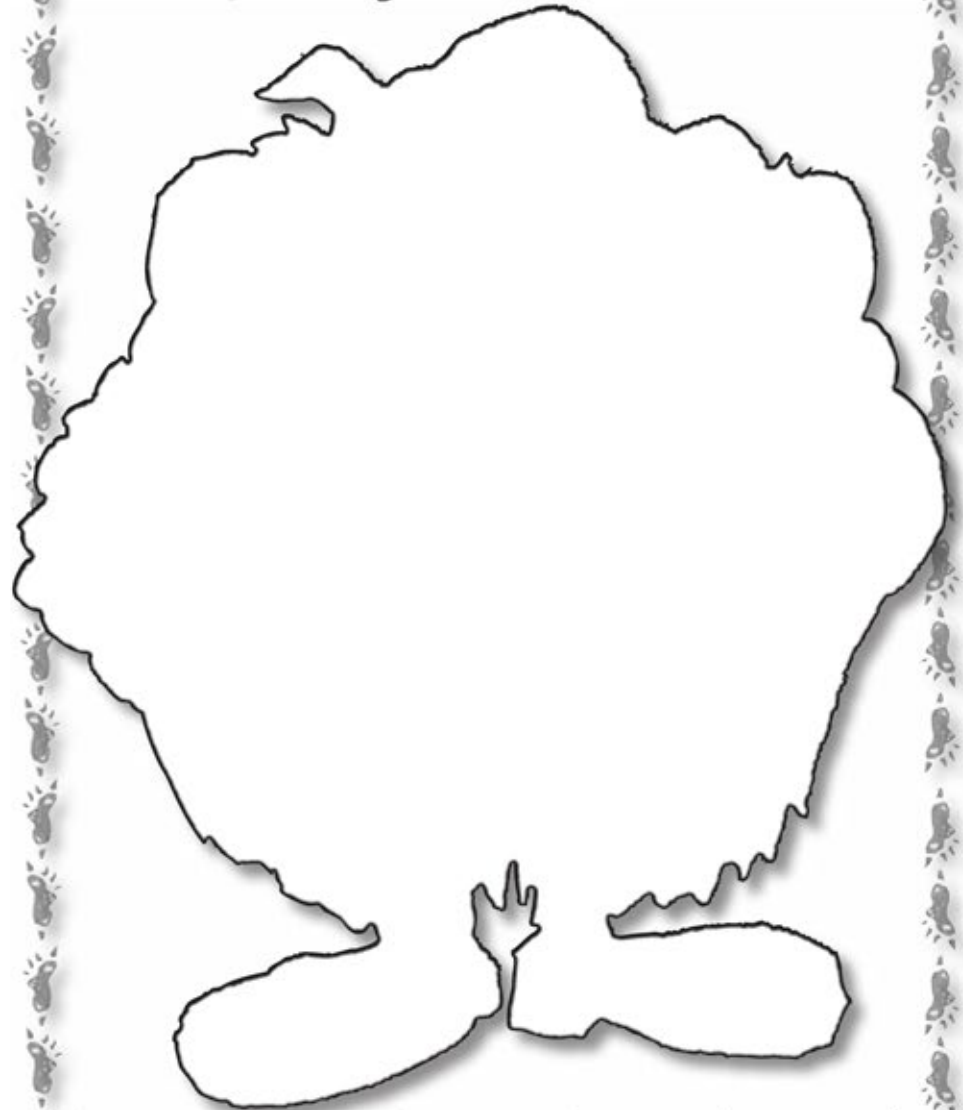
At the end of a pleasant evening, Maude was very surprised to hear Leonard say, 'I had a really great time, but I know I'll never ever hear from you.'

A. Because they are so wrapped up in themselves!



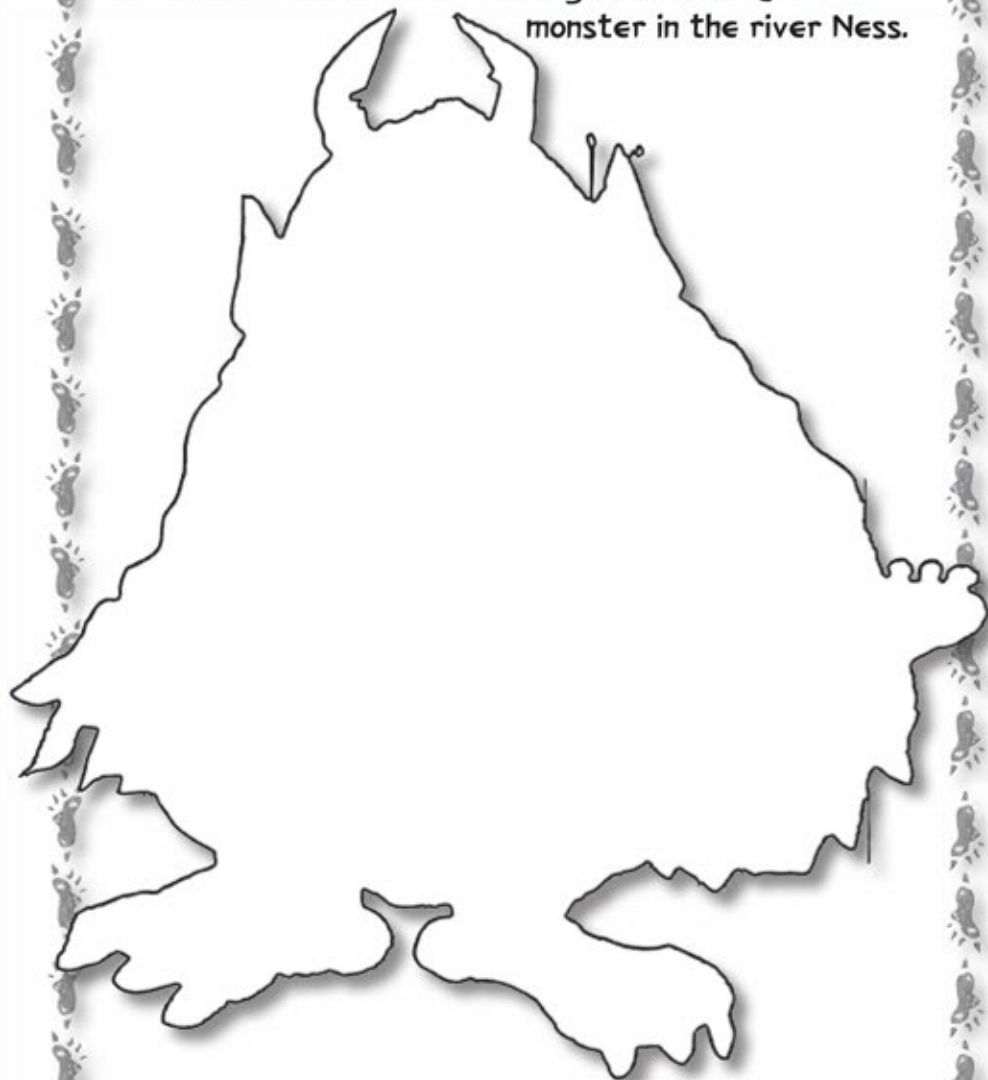

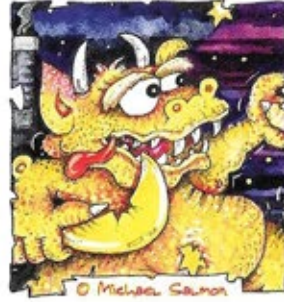
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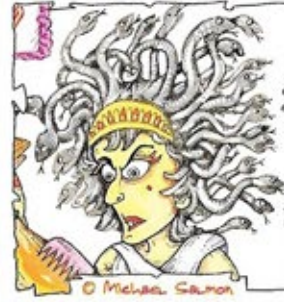
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
